Deep Paint is the challenger to Corel's Painter. I have used Painter for a few years and when I read about Deep Paint I was curious. Deep Paint is a paint application that creates a 3-D look to 2-D images. It does this by adding a bump or texture and shine or luminance to every stroke. This creates depth within each stroke, and the finished image does have 3-D quality.

Deep Paint works as a stand-alone program or as a plug-in to Photoshop. I had no problems with either application. It's a pleasure to use an application that works as a plug-in filter in Photoshop, for it cuts time wasted going back and forth between the two applications.

Even though **Deep Paint** features aren't as numerous as those in Painter, everything you need is here.

It has a wide range of brushes that are highly customizable, with a wonderful variety of media, including paint, air brush, chalk, felt pens, pencil, crayons and charcoal, to name a few. Less is more, and to that end, **Deep Paint** knows what is important to an artist. I don't need more crayons. I just need to know where they are and how to use them. I had no trouble finding the canvas selection, for it is right there on the tool palette, not hidden four clicks away.

The artistic photo cloning is a quick way to transform a photograph with many options, such as a colored pencil sketch or a painterly image. The images can be very tight or loose as you have control over every stroke.

When using paints, the effects are incredible! You are able to control the bump or shine on each stroke, creating depth within each. A fellow student in art school painted a copy of a Van Gogh painting. He did each paint stroke with a shadow and a highlight; this gave the illusion of a 3-D painting. It took him months to create this. Years later, I see this exact feature in **Deep Paint**, where it takes not months, but moments to produce!

Within the standard tools category there are many presets that are in sub-categories of their own. There is a sub-category called *Fun Stuff;* in there you'll find such things as *alien wire, jungle bridge, blobs and microbe,* to name a few. Another subcategory is *Skins Fur and Hair.* There



you'll find bear fur, frog skin, elephant hide and crocodile skin. With names like these, it sounds as if you could design a jungle scene—within the comfort of your living room.

A unique feature of **Deep Paint** that I really appreciate is a reminder to save your work. I find that when I begin to paint, it seems like I just started and I suddenly realize that hours have gone by. This reminder, which pops up every fifteen minutes or so, is much-needed, as we are working in an electronic medium and all could be lost within seconds.

The people at Right Hemisphere have certainly worked hard at designing an intuitive and fun program to use. This is only version 1.1b, and I think the future looks good for them. The only thing I don't understand is that a high percentage of artist use Macs, and **Deep Paint** is a Windows product. If they want to appeal to artists, they should develop a Mac version. This is a big concern of mine, for I have really become fond of **Deep Paint**, and as I write this I plan to switch from PC to Mac. Does that mean I have to go back to Painter?

What next? The PENTIUM 4!

Pentium 4 (P4) is the latest Intel processor (codenamed *Willamette*), released in November 2000. The new processor has a viable clock speed of 1.5 gigahertz (GHz) - as compared to the 1 GHz of the Pentium 3 - and is likely to be available with a rate of at least 2 GHz by the end of 2001.

P4 has the first totally new chip architecture since the 1995 Pentium Pro. The major difference involves structural changes that affect the way processing takes place within the chip, something Intel calls NetBurst micro- architecure. Aspects of the changes include: a 20-stage pipeline, which boosts performance by increasing processor frequency; a rapid-execution engine, which doubles the core frequency and reduces latency by enabling each instruction to be executed in a half (rather than a whole) clock cycle; a 400 MHz system bus, which enables transfer rates of 3.2 gigabytes per second (GBps); an execution trace cache, which optimizes cache memory efficiency and reduces latency by storing decoded sequences of micro-operations; and improved floating point and multimedia unit and advanced dynamic execution, all of which enable faster processing for especially demanding applications, such as digital video, voice recognition, and online gaming.

P4's main competition for processor market share is the AMD Athlon processor. A number of industry test results (such as those from PC Magazine Labs and Tom's Hardware Guide) have found the P4 was faster than the Athlon for streaming video, 3-D graphics programs, and some similarly demanding applications, but that the Athlon processor - which is significantly less expensive - was faster for the types of tasks that make up the bulk of the typical home or business PC's workload.

Those ZIP & PDF files

Trouble with some of those attachments and downloads? What do I do with those *.zip (a data compressed file) and *.pdf (Portable Document Format compressed file) files ?

One of the most important things we need first is a program to unzip compressed files labeled as Zip files. There are several programs out there such as Aladdin, Winzip, etc. Winzip is the easiest and most widely used and a trial version can be downloaded free from the internet: www.winzip.com

After downloading Winzip (winzip80.exe is latest version) save it to a folder such as "My Downloads" or what ever folder you want, so you can find it. If you have an older version remove it first by going to START/SETTINGS/CONTROL PANEL, then double click on ADD/REMOVE PROGRAMS. See if Winzip is on the list, if Winzip is there, then click on it to highlight, then click on the Remove button to uninstall it.

Now you are ready to install Winzip by finding your file using Windows Explorer and doing a double click on your downloaded file (winzip80.exe), or go to START/RUN, type in C:\My Downloads\winzip80.exe and click on OK. The program called WINZIP will install itself and put icons on the Start Up menu, the Desktop

and in the Program listing. (I delete the one on the Desk Top with a right click and selecting Delete). Now we are ready to unzip those compressed files received from email, web, etc.

To unzip a file is very easy, just select your file and do a double click, Winzip will automatically come up showing you what is in the zip file. Go to the top right and click on EXTRACT! This will bring up the menu that allows you to select the folder you wish to extract and save the file(s). After you have the folder selected click on the EXTRACT button. That's all there is, now you can go to your folder and work your extracted or unzipped file(s).

If your unzipped files are picture files and you double click on them they will come up in Windows Paint (*.bmp) or Internet Explorer (*.jpg, *.gif, etc), unless you have a photo program. If the files are text files your will see them in Notepad or wordpad, or you can view them in your word processor. If they are PDF (Portable Document Format) files then we need a special program called Acrobat Reader by Adobe.

To get your free Acrobat Reader, go to: www.adobe.com/prodcts/acrobat/readstep.html

Save your file (ar40eng.exe) in your special folder such as "My Downloads." Before installing this program be sure you remove the old version (this is version 4) just like we did for Winzip. Now go to your special folder and locate the acrobat file and double click to install it, or go to START/RUN and enter C:\My Downloads\ar40eng.exe, then click on OK. Restart Windows!


Once this is installed and Windows is back up, you can double click on any PDF file and the Acrobat Reader will come up automatically.

I hope this helps people to read those email attachments and program manuals!

Microsoft IntelliMouse Explorer

f you have ever used a mouse, you will love this one!

For years, the "mouse" has always operated in the same way. You move the mouse on the mouse pad and the ball in the mouse moves on two roller bars, one for vertical and one for horizontal movement of the cursor, two buttons on the front, one on the left and one on the right. There were some that had a wheel in between the buttons for scrolling, and others that had a third button in the middle.

Microsoft has outdone itself this time. They have come out with a mouse that has done away with the ball and rollers. Finally, a mouse that you don't have to keep cleaning! There is no opening on the underside, so there is no way for dirt and lint to buildup in it. Nothing to make the mouse operate in a erratic fashion. (It was always fun to try to move the cursor up and to the left and it would go about half way and stop...you all know what I mean!)

The **IntelliMouse** has an optical sensor called the "IntelliEye." "It uses a tiny CMOS digital camera to take 1,500 pictures per second of the surface beneath the mouse. A digital signal processor then analyzes these pictures and translates movement of the mouse into crisp movement of the cursor on your computer screen." By doing this, you can use the mouse on any surface that has a grain or pattern of some type. It may have a problem with shiny surfaces and mirrors, but I haven't found anything that it didn't work on yet. If your work requires precise mouse movement, this is the way to go. Also, your mouse movement is no longer limited to the size of your mouse pad.

The mouse comes with a wheel for scrolling and zooming. You also have a couple of extra programmable buttons; two buttons on the left side of the mouse can be programmed any way you want. If you are a surfer, you can use them as forward and back buttons. In your word processor you can program them to be you copy and paste keys. I like this feature, it is a real time saver.

This mouse has a new, comfortable feel to it. The arched shape lets your palm rest on it in a comfortable position. For those of us who spend a long day with our mice, this is a real breakthrough in comfort. I would recommend the **IntelliMouse Explorer** to every serious computer user. I didn't know what I was missing until I got mine.

Microsoft Sidewinder Force Feedback 2 Joystick

Computer games have come a long way since I started playing them. Remember when you downloaded a shareware game to play in DOS? Everything was controlled with the keyboard and/or mouse. As the programs became more sophisticated, so did the gaming devices. I have been using a Sidewinder 3D Pro Joystick for quite a while and thought that I would never need another, until now!

I'm sure that many of us have played games that said that they were Force-Feedback-compatible. Let me tell you, we didn't know what we were missing! Playing a game such as *MS Midtown Madness* or *MotoRacer 2* with the **Sidewinder Force Feedback 2** is a whole new experience.

You need to load the driver, which comes on a CD, before plugging the joystick into an AC outlet and your USB port. The joystick has a 16-bit 25-MHz on-board processor that delivers 100 different forces to your fingertips. There is a throttle lever on the side and the handle can be turned to operate as a rudder controller. There are 8 programmable buttons and an 8-way hat switch that can also be programmed, to give you a total of 16. The handle has been set up so that all the buttons and the trigger are all convenient to your touch. It also knows when you are ready for action, through a photo-optical beam that is interrupted when you grip the stick. The base of the device is large and because of the motors inside, it has weight to it. This makes it more stable than other joysticks. In the heat of battle or just crashing into things, you won't feel like you have to hold it down. Instead, you will feel every gun or missile fired, every bump or crash, all through the handle of the joystick.

I tried it out on a few games that I had played with my old joystick to get a true comparison. From the first jump in *MotoRacer*, I knew that I was in for a wild ride. All of a sudden, instead of just seeing and hearing, you are adding in another sense—touch. It's like you are riding the dirt bike in the race. As you land, you feel the impact in the joystick, just as you would on the



bike. The normal joystick functions seem to be improved too; the bike reacts to your movement smoothly and more quickly.

When I took-off in MS Combat Flight Simulator, it was like nothing I have ever experienced in a game. In my first dog fight, the vibration of the guns firing and feeling the impact of the bullets as they penetrated the windshield was as real as I want it to get.

This was lots of fun. I guess the next step would have to be virtual reality.

Logitech Cordless Freedom Navigator

I'd like to start by thanking the RPCUG Board and the entire membership for affording me this opportunity. Hopefully this is just the first of many. Now, on with the review!

The CORDLESS FREEDOM NAVIGATOR is a complete wireless desktop solution consisting of an "iTouch Keyboard," "MouseMan Wheel" mouse and a radio receiver. The system uses radio frequency (RF) technology facilitate communication from keyboard and mouse to the receiver. Unlike infrared (IR), RF doesn't require the components to be "looking" at each other for proper operation. This allows for greater flexibility in terms of placement and movement. The keyboard combines traditional functionality with multimedia, Internet, and system controls. In addition to the traditional button layout of wheeled mice, i.e. left-wheel+middle-right, Logitech has placed a fourth button on the right side just below the thumb. Logitech provides quick-start and comfort guides in four languages, and a CD containing the software needed to program the keyboard and mouse buttons. They've even thrown in a coupon for a 10% rebate on a future purchase of Logitech products.

I have two comments regarding installation on Windows ME systems that merit mentioning. First, support for Windows ME is not mentioned anywhere, not on the box, the install guide, or even the CD label. However, there is a "WinME" folder on the CD, and the "readme.txt" file has a WinME section, so immediate web-surfing for updates is not mission-critical. Second, the use of USB for the keyboard in WinME is advised against by Logitech because you will not be able to program the extra buttons. Outside of that, installation is simple and straightforward: install batteries (provided) into the keyboard and mouse, attach the radio receiver to the computer (via PS/2 or USB), establish communications between the receiver + keyboard + mouse (a simple matter of pressing "connect" buttons on all the units), boot the computer, install the software, re-boot and enjoy! The installation guide clearly illustrates all the steps above, ensuring success for all.

The "iTouch Keyboard" keys lack the distinct click of an IBM, but they are by no means mushy, and besides, silence is not such a bad thing! An interesting aspect of the keyboard is that it physically lacks indicators for NumLock, CapLock and ScrollLock. Those indicators are displayed in the system tray. It is unconventional, but

the status of each is easily read. The mul-

timedia and Internet keys, as well as the

system key, are controlled and programmed by the "iTouch" program. Pressing the "play/pause" button starts the default CD player whatever that may be. The rest of the multimedia keys perform the usual functions such as speaker mute and next track. The Internet keys, or "iKeys", can start your e-mail client, zip you to your homepage, or begin a web-search. I think Logitech intends them to be used for Internet-specific tasks, but in reality you can assign them to start any program you like. The system key functions in one of two ways; if you have power management enabled, it will put your system in suspend mode, if not, it will bring up the Windows shut-down dialog box. I found the keyboard performed as promised, with the added benefits of enough programmable keys to be actually useful and of being wireless. With respect to being wireless. I found I could exceed Logitech's maximum range, but not by much. I would expect most people will place the keyboard on their lap, and then tilt back in the 'ole office chair, much as I'm doing now. I say: "mission accomplished, Logitech!"

The "MouseMan Wheel" is conventional and unique at the same time. Conventionally speaking, the button layout and default functions are like those of most other wheel mice and it requires a surface of some kind to roll around on. The uniqueness is evident in the design (a four-buttoned swoopy shape decidedly aimed at

right-handers), and the "MouseWare" software. The fourth button, under the thumb, is a double-edged sword. I found it convenient to have another button at my disposal, but I also found it a little too easy to activate by mistake. And if you have it set to "end program" like I did, WILL be frustrated. you "MouseWare" can assign any function to any button, so that problem was short-lived. I can't see why anyone would want to change the normal functions of the left and right mouse

buttons, but it's possible here. The neatest thing has to be Logitech's "WebWheel". This program, when activated, displays a circular graphic divided into 10 pie wedges. Half of the wedges are pre-programmed with browser commands such as back, reload, and stop, while the other half are user assignable in a fashion similar to "Favorites" in Internet Explorer. It's very convenient to be two clicks away from these functions without a

lot of cursor motion. The range of the mouse is significantly less than that of the keyboard, but I think the main benefit of being wireless here is to reduce desk clutter.

Overall, the **Freedom Navigator** is easy to setup, performs as designed, and offers enough convenience features to enhance the usability of your computer without requiring dedicated study. To me, Logitech got it all right with the **Freedom Navigator**.

COREL GALLERY 380,000

As a Corel devotee and a certified clipartaholic, I looked forward to a loving relationship with these Corel images. It was not to be.

After a simple installation, I opened to the main screen and did a search on the word "Christmas." It came up with over 1000 hits, but the thumbnails were all the same generic icon. When I tried to open one, I was asked to "insert CD 2." I did so, but there was no response. The same dialogue box appeared over and over, and did not repond to the fact that I had put the proper CD in the drive. I tried again with another image and another CD, with the same results.

A third try brought something even more bizarre - when I clicked on an image to open it, it opened in Quick View Plus (a Windows utility).

A trip through the manual described all manner of support options, most of them costing \$\$. I was led to Corel's web site, where the only free option was to send them an email message, which I did.

Their reply was prompt: "If the Gallery browser does not have ample time for the system to read the CD, it goes into what we commonly refer to as the "insert Loop" and the message doesn't go away. The only workarounds are to allow the CD to read and have the images automatically pop up after the CD is recognized or you can shut down the Gallery browser and relaunch it so that the browser will be reading off the new CD..."

At this point, my patience grew thin. I decided to check out the fonts before throwing in the towel.

The manual indicated that they were on CD1, although there was nothing on the CD label that said so. I was unable to access them directly. Any attempt to read the contents of the CD launched the installation setup.

I decided on a frontal attack. In DOS, I downloaded the fonts and sounds to my hard drive. With My Portfolio (freeware) I was able to cata-

logue the jpeg photos (which are very nice, I admit). The clipart, however, is in CCX format which can only be read by Corel Photo House or by this thoroughly annoying Gallery browser.

There's nice stuff here, but accessing it is a pain in the neck. The price is worth it for the fonts alone, but I wouldn't recommend it to any but the seasoned user.


The computer scientist leaned back in her chair, and with a sly smile responded, "Yes, but who do you think created the chaos?"
