But women techies are tired of their gender being relegated to cosmetic roles used to attract potential male clients, and this year they are doing something about it

The trade show needs "less booth babes and more highly skilled, highly qualified, highly intelligent women," said Kristine Hanna, CEO of GirlGeeks, a community-oriented website for professional women in technology. Women should be represented at Comdex more by what they think than what they look like.

One female executive hopes that the boys club environment that she saw five years ago has changed. "Both times (in the mid-90s) I felt like I was a secondary participant," said Debra Garber, CFO and COO of GirlGeeks. "You're there to look good behind the booth." Garber will be back at Comdex this year, but is still leery of the "machismo" atmosphere. Garber is hopeful that the response to the GirlGeeks events is evidence that things are changing.

"Comdex needs (women) there to raise the bar, to be familiar with the products and services that are offered, and test the new technologies," Hanna said.

"Women comprise 47 percent of the U.S. workforce but hold only 28 percent of the IT industry jobs," said Kim Myhre, brand president of Key3Media Events, which organizes the event, in a statement.

Women attendees, who make up about 20 percent of the 200,000 Comdex-goers, are invited to the first Comdex/GirlGeeks Forum for women at the conference on Nov. 13. Female IT professionals will have the opportunity to mingle and network with their industry colleagues.

Over 2,500 people have signed up to attend the evening gathering (10 percent of which are men), which will also bestow the first to an outstanding woman in the technology industry.

This year's winner is Lynda Weinman, co-founder and CEO of *Lynda.com*, a site that creates educational materials for Web designers. Weinman has written numerous books, and produced videos and CD-ROM tutorials on Web design. She also founded the in California, which offers weeklong courses on Flash and Adobe Web design, among others.

"It always feels great to be honored, especially as a role model for other women in technology," Weinman said. "I'm happy that women feel empowered by materials that I produce."

Announcing:A NEW CLUB WITHIN OUR CLUB!

In order to make your participation in the RPCUG Investment SIG more interesting, I have created a NO MONEY NEEDED Investment club. You are not required to invest any real money. No money will be used.

By using the internet you will be able to vote on the changes in the RPCUG Investment SIG's portfolio. Monthly, a fictitious credit of a predetermined amount will be added into your account and added to the group's fictitious portfolio.

Street Atlas USA, version 8.0

STREET ATLAS USA VERSION 8.0 is a mature software title from DeLorme, one of the early originators of this type of mapping program. This is one of the handiest software titles you can have if you do a lot of traveling or if you just enjoy using maps. I've successfully used the **Street Atlas** series for many years to plot routes throughout the US for trips or to provide transport for my family to or from destinations within a 100 mile radius of my home.

When my son said there was a home-coming dance in a location about 50 miles from home and he had just the address, I put **Street Atlas** to work to find the location on the street and then to provide step-by-step printed directions along with several printed maps of varying magnification. Included on the maps were my own annotations showing names, telephone numbers or highlighted routes, mileage, etc.

There are several Internet-based services (MapBlast, MapQuest, etc.) that provide location

services with the ability to provide a map. There is a major difference using these as compared to a program based on your own PC. Primarily, the PC-based product provides a quantum leap increase in both speed and detail. I find it very frustrating dealing with the Internet-based products when I need a speedy answer. I do find the Internet-based programs to be more up-to-date regarding roads and addresses. **Street Atlas** solves this problem neatly by allowing

me to run the program from the supplied CD and update over the Internet from its website. I get construction, road and weather updates neatly incorporated into my resulting maps.


Street Atlas still requires reasonable PC resources to run well. Running Windows 95B on my Pentium 120 MHz with 64 megabytes RAM, performance was good running with most of the data resources on the "Program Data" CD.

Installation proved easy as with previous versions. There are two CDs provided. The first is used solely for installation. The second is used when I want to run the program. There is, also, an extractor mode. This allows me to extract data for one of our 50 US states onto the hard drive. The data is quite space-consuming, but speed performance improves dramatically. Realize that there is a massive amount of

data involved in providing every street in the US and locating any address on any of those streets. New York State required several hundred megabytes for its data. Keep in mind that the program runs from the CD very reasonably, and still provides a leap in performance over Internet-based programs.

With a few clicks of the mouse, you can locate just about any place in the US. There is substantial data provided about businesses, education and technology, government offices, parks and religious institutions. And businesses, for instance, are broken down into 17 different categories. The amount of data included is staggering. I can zoom in or out to include any level of detail from the entire US to a single street. Then, I can annotate the map with symbols, etc.

The list of user friendly options is vast. I gave it a start address and an end address and I got a route plotted with several points of interest in between included. Mileage and travel time and all services at exits were shown. I can give it telephone area codes or find zip codes and then use the zip code to find a more specific address location. When I pass the cursor over a street, the staus bar below shows the name and address range of the location.



There is so much that is positive and that I enjoy about using Street Atlas that I feel compelled to find at least some negative aspects. One operating characteristic that takes a bit of time to become comfortable with is the way in which the mouse cursor is used. A crosshair mouse cursor appears when a map is displayed. Clicking the left mouse button re-centers the map at whatever point the

mouse cursor is located. Other mouse oriented features are very effective. For instance, dragging a rectangle will redraw the map with a level of magnification sufficient to use the enclosed area for the entire screen. Also, on the negative side, my scroll mouse controls do not work with **Street Atlas.** These negatives are very minor annoyances considering all that is positive about this affordable and excellent map data base.

Street Atlas can be hooked in to work with a GPS (Global Positioning Device) that is useful if you are traveling with your computer. It pinpoints your location on the displayed map and can keep you from getting lost. This option has been available for several years. Now, with the advent of cheaply available GPS devices, this can be a cost effective way to travel the country without fear of getting off-track.

AAA Map'n'Go by DeLorme

Map'n'Go is intended for professional and leisure travel planning, with extensive travel information covering the US, Canada and Mexico. A database of services found near highway exits includes gas stations, food, lodging, rest areas, ATMs, auto service/repair, local/state police and medical services. Combined with the AAA Tourbook database of accommodations, restaurants and attractions, I found Map'n'Go an impressive trip-planning tool.

The ability to search by placename, address, zip or area code proved to be quick, straightforward and easy to use. I defined a user profile selecting: a scenic route for this trip (although the quickest, shortest were other choices available), avoidance of roads with construction or congestion, set my budget limits for accommodations and restaurants, indication of places that accept pets and cultural attractions along the way. I then selected the starting point: Nyack, NY, ending point: Richmond, VA, and intermediate stops: New Hope, PA, to browse the country lanes and Philadelphia, PA, to visit friends. Map'n'Go automatically calculated the distance and driving time(s).

By selecting the along the way option, I had the opportunity to compile a list of attractions, restaurants and points of interest within 10, 20 or 50 miles of my route. Map'n'Go automatically compiles a list from which you can select individual items in order to obtain more information. I made a mental note the day before my trip to download the latest information on weather forecasts, upcoming events and road construction. Note: radio station information is also available. Viewing and moving around the maps is easy: zoom in and out. The problem of finding out-of-town destinations was completely eliminated. I was able to create high quality, easy-to-follow custom-made maps that let me zero in on my destination. I quickly found streets, addresses and points of interest. A variety of hard-copy trip prints include directions, maps, detailed location maps and an AAA-style strip map of the whole route.

Map'n'Go also supports GPS receivers. You can upload maps, directions and AAA listings to handheld computers/organizers. For those traveling families with kids there is the Kids' Travel Activities. Just print out a variety of fun, entertaining and/or educational things to do for all ages. And, hopefully, that will entertain everyone until the next rest stop. And, finally, there is Trip Pix which let you create a slide show of your trip that you can share in person or e-mail to family and friends.

I found **Map'n'Go** a convenient routing program with comprehensive destination and location content. The online travel information is powerful and impressive in its depth and organization, so much so in fact that I don't know how I ever planned a trip without it.

XMap Business by DeLorme

XMAP BUSINESS IS FAIRLY SIMPLE TO USE, but does have great tutorials included in it. The installation was flawless, and of course, I started using the program without looking at the documentation. I have been using other DeLorme programs for many years, so it was fairly simple to maneuver within the menus, as they have kept with their general format. The DeLorme programs that I have used in the past are Street Atlas USA & Phone Search. It seems that XMap has brought these two programs together and then added many more features. It even gives you the ability to search for zip codes and area codes. Many times you will receive an area code or a zip code in a message and you have no idea were they are located. All you need to do is to do a search for either one and it will have the answer for you.

XMap comes as an eight-CD set. One is the installation disk and the other seven are data disks for different regional areas of the country. To run the program, you inserts the appropriate CD and double-click the program icon located on your desktop. If you keep your CD search feature on, it will start automatically by inserting the CD.

The program can be used the same as *Street Atlas USA* to find an address and to print out directions to your destination. It has the ability to search by Place Name, Street Address, Phonebook Listing, Zip Code, Phone Number and even a few more. You can even do a search to find a street intersection. (e.g. S. Middletown Rd & Route 59, Nanuet, NY) The basic functions are very similar, you use your mouse for centering and zooming in on an area. They even gave you the ability to magnify the print on your map, for those of us that feel that the print is always to small.

When I accepted the offer to do a review on **XMap**, I had one thing in mind: I wanted to do a mailing to specific areas in Rockland County. I did a search by Zip Code and then chose the streets that I wanted to target in my mailing; then I exported this information into a text file. I was then able to import the information into my word processor, MS Word 97, and do a mail merge to a form letter and print the envelopes for the mailing. I found this entire process much easier than I had anticipated.

BTW: I did watch the tutorials before attempting this project.

If you have a database with all your customers or clients, you can import it and use it to make up your route. What a time saver this is! You can even pick a location and get a list of everyone within a radius that you designate.

For anyone who has ever needed to make up a sales or delivery route, this is the software for you!

All you do is click on the "Navigate" tab. Click on the "New" button and enter a name for your route. Click on the "Start" button and mouse click on the location that you would like to start. You can then add your stops by clicking on the "Stop" button and choosing from a vast choice of search criteria.

Place Name, Street Address, Phonebook Listing, Zip Code, etc. I like to use the address search if I don't know where I am going. You just repeat the stop choice for all your customers or clients. Then you click on the "Finish" button and choose were you want to finish. You then click on the "Calculate" button. XMap calculates the shortest route and lets you print out the results. You can print an overhead map with all the stops shown, or you can print a route map that has the directions, street by street, at the bottom.

The directions include the beginning and ending points for each route; the distance and travel time between each of your stops; directions between each stop, even exit numbers, if there are any.

The program also has the ability to add personal notes and labels to your route map using the "Draw" function. This helps if you need to make a note of specific instructions or just the name of your contact. A little reminder of the names of the employees is very helpful - people are always impressed when you remember their names.

Another very useful search feature is the ability to search for a specific type of business along your route. You can use "Yellow Page" type listings to make a list. You can also limit the search to within a specified distance off your route. If you want to know if there are any restaurants that are no further than ½ mile off your route, it will give you a list. You can even narrow it down by what type of food. (American, Italian, Mexican, Chinese, etc.)

If you have an internet connection you can make use of another feature, NetLink. This allows you to get up to date information about you route. You can check the weather, road construction and events that are planned along you route. This is a great feature for those who are on a schedule. If there is road construction in progress, you can choose another

route to bypass it or if there is bad weather in the forecast you can leave a little earlier.

The program can be used with a GPS (Global Positioning Device). This device, when hooked up to your laptop computer, can let you know were you are at all times. It even has the option of voice navigation. Press your F5 key and it will tell you the time and distance to you next turn. DeLorme has its own GPS receiver called Earthmate. I do not have a laptop computer, so I was not able to really get to see the full ability of this system in action. I did hook it up to my home computer and was able to get the exact location. (Latitude N41 21.1512 / Longitude W74 20.8914 Elevation 510.60') All I needed to do was put in 4 AAA batteries and connect it to my COM port and the program did the rest.

If you have ever used any type of mapping program, this one is up near the top. I was truly impressed by everything that it could do. I tried to use as many of the functions as I could to be able to give you a fair review of the program.

I would highly recommend **Xmap Business** to anyone who is in outside sales or a company that is in the delivery business. There are also many benefits for businesses that are involved in bulk mailing and phone solicitation.

Virus Wishes You A Merry Christmas

CHRISTMAS HAS ARRIVED EARLY for some computer users, but the present they're receiving is



not from Santa. Anti-virus experts reported...a new Internet worm called Navidad@m, which enters a person's computer as an e-mail attachment disguised as a Christmas greeting.

When the victim clicks on the "Navidad.exe" file, the virus is saved in the Windows system directory and a blue eye icon appears in the system tray next to the clock in the lower right corner of the monitor. Every time the victim receives an e-mail, the virus automatically responds with the infected attachment.

The virus, which spreads through Microsoft Outlook and Outlook Express, does not delete, overwrite, or hide files, so is not as damaging as other types of infections.

CONTROVERSIAL CUE-CAT

THERE IS A CATFIGHT GOING ON about a cat-shaped scanner called a "CueCat", being given out by companies such as Radio Shack, Forbes and Wired magazines to their customers. The maker, Digital Convergence, began shipping more than 1 million of the scanners in hopes of introducing customers to a new technology that bridges the printed word with the Web. By installing the little hand scanner to your computer, customers can swipe bar codes either on products or within printed ads in magazines or catalogs to go to related Web sites with more information. Users must first go to the Digital Convergence Website and register personal information such as name, email address, gender, age range and ZIP code. "Whenever you scan something, your browser will make a connection with Digital Convergence's site, reports the bar code, your device number and a token that identifies you as an individual," a spokesman at an Internet security consultant group called Interhack said. Privacy advocates have expressed concerns about the possibility.

Recently a security breach at Digital Convergence caused 140,000 consumer names, email addresses and zip codes to be exposed. "For the people that registered via our Web site...a hacker exploited a known error in the data script and was able to look into the data file," said Dave Mathews, vice president of new product development at Dallas-based Digital Convergence. "From there, they could extrapolate the name, email address, age range, gender and Zip code of new members." DigitalConvergence took immediate steps to close the hole, and sent details about the problem and \$10 gift certificates to the compromised customers. Similar problems at companies such as

Eve.com, IKEA's catalog order site and Amazon.com have occurred within the last few months.

The fact that data has been compromised due to security breaches and the "appearance" of customer tracking by Digital convergence has some privacy groups concerned. Researchers say each scanner's unique ID number could be used to trace the actions of an individual user and create a detailed database on what the consumer is interested in, along with their email address and personal information they have registered. A Digital Convergence spokesman said however, that the company is not tracking this type of information. He said customer registration information is retained only for the purposes of general demographics. "There is a unique ID within the CueCat so that we can see that some Cats came from Forbes and some came from Wired," said Dave Mathews, vice president of new product Digital Convergence. development at individualized serial numbers are not designed to track individual behavior." Privacy advocates counter that the company has not adequately disclosed its practices.

Meanwhile, inventive programmers have found a way to use the CueCat without registering. One way is not to use the Cat's software. Cat Kit 32 at http://members.aol.com/powercntrl lets you download free software that decodes the output of the scanner into

any 32-bit windows application. Or check out http://www.readerware.com, where you'll find a product that can catalog your book library by swiping the bar codes on your books. And because you don't have to use the software that comes with Cue Cat, privacy issues aren't a concern. Readerware has been around for a while, and they now support Linux. (This software is \$40, but you can try it free for 30 days.)

Get your kitty-cat when you ask for a catalog at your local Radio Shack.


